

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT

As the new Director of Development, I look forward to partnering with you to enhance Montessori Community School's (MCS) strengths and innovate for the future. Fatherhood has taught me that there is nothing more important than helping our children develop a lifelong passion for learning and providing them with opportunities to maximize their potential. In only three months, I've experienced, first hand, how generous all of you are. This is what you helped us to accomplish during the 2020-2021 school year:

- Our Children's Education Fund, which includes proceeds from this year's Virtual Fun Run, helped provide over \$50,000 of financial aid to 23 students, or 14% of enrollment.
- Over \$6,800 was given in support of the Jerry Mueller Teacher Training Fund. To date, this fund has provided nearly \$30,000 to MCS teachers working on their Montessori certification. This year's recipient was Ms. Sheryl Lomongo, Preschool & Kindergarten teacher.
- Foodland's *Give Aloha* program, raised over \$10,000 to provide professional development opportunities for our teachers. Ms. Monika Day, an Upper Elementary teacher, attended a National Geographic workshop, giving her new resources to help her students develop a passion for exploring the world.

GRACE, RESILIENCY, COURAGE, COMMUNITY -THE MAGIC OF MCS

When I was a young girl – some 33 years ago (but who's counting) – my thirst for lifelong learning began, and I found refuge in the library at Hawaii Baptist Academy, where I got lost in *The Babysitter's Club and Chronicles of Narnia*. Today, that library on Nehoa Street is still a refuge for curious young minds, but now known as the Little House right here at Montessori Community School.

When I stepped back onto that Nehoa campus on March 17, 2020, I knew immediately I was back home — now MCS, rather than Hawaii Baptist Academy from which I graduated — with the roots and tenets focused on all the right things: curious minds, respect for self and others, compassion, and humanity.

What none of us knew in March of 2020 is that those tenets would be tested over the coming months. The entire world shifted quickly, navigating a new Covid reality that sent children home to their screens and away from their friends and classrooms while parents added new and more complicated balls to their daily juggling act. Faculty and staff were thrust into unknown terrain, figuring out how to keep our students and families safe and engaged. And on top of all of that, we were all scared. The unknown is hard. It's stressful, whether we're eight years old or 42 years old.







Now, nearly two years later, I'm in awe of MCS' capacity and ingenuity at all levels – the students, parents, teachers, staff, administration, board, alumni and donors. We hear the words all the time – "everyone stepped up" – and they did. But it's more than that. In all rights, it should have been chaotic, or stressful or so many other words that denote the severity and difficulties of the challenges we faced. But we didn't see that at MCS. Instead, we saw grace. We saw patience. We saw ingenuity and creativity and occasional silliness. We saw leadership, and we saw a committed, united team that rowed together without a moment of doubt. We saw community.



That's the magic of MCS.

This small but mighty community empowering the next generation of leaders, scientists, writers, artists, and community members. No matter the storm, you equip students with the imagination knowledge, confidence, and courage to reach their highest potential. What a privilege to have been a part of this resilient community where "education for life" is not just a motto, but a firm belief in the stability, strength, and positive impact of Montessori Community School.

Our alumni tell us that they were forged by MCS — that the values, learning styles, time management and intellectual curiosity that guide them today were planted right here on this campus.

Now, two years later, I find myself feeling the same way I did many years ago, only now my aloha goes out to all of you. During my short time here, the grace, patience, and leadership I witnessed is unparalleled in normal times. Yet in these extraordinary times, you did what you do, and the tenets that MCS holds tightly lifted you and this little community during a vicious storm.

In the midst of a global pandemic, political unrest, dire economic times, and fear of the unknown, these values ground MCS. They remind us that we are at our best when we come together, find common ground, listen, and respect one another.

For nearly 50 years, MCS has cultivated hundreds of lifelong learners, empowering them to pursue their interests, develop their strengths, and understand the world so they may choose their place within it.





KYLIE DUNN - THE SCHOOL COUNSELOR WE DIDN'T KNOW WE NEEDED

Sometimes, it's all about timing. Who knew when Kylie Dunn joined the MCS community in 2018 as a substitute teacher after teaching at a Montessori school in Omaha that she'd assist the MCS school administration in laying the groundwork to navigate a pandemic that was looming just over the horizon?

Having developed a keen interest in social and emotional learning as an integral part of a student's education, Kylie returned to school for her counseling credential and graduate training, and then set about creating a counselor position at MCS with the Head of School – an educational leader well-known for her innovation and commitment to teaching the whole child.

When school opened its 2019-2020-year, Kylie Dunn stepped up as School Counselor and Learning Support, a position defined as counseling students, staff, and parents on social, emotional, and academic matters and leading exercises in the classroom to bring social and emotional learning directly into their daily lives.

"Covid threw all of us for a loop," she says, noting that she saw the impact on the entire community right away. "Covid was (and remains) a large-scale trauma and a scary time, wondering how to stay safe when even adults weren't sure. The children were even more in the dark than we were." She quickly saw signs of trauma, anxiety, and even PTSD, and turned to a "trauma informed approach" to navigate the unknown with students, families, and staff.



"Children need to feel safe, supported, and significant," she says, and with Covid, none of that felt guaranteed. Not entirely sure it would work, she turned to mindfulness training, asking the students to lay on the

floor and slowly go through body awareness, head to toe. "I watched even our most raucous and squiggly students embrace the techniques and it became meaningful for them," she said, and was thrilled when children and parents reported students were continuing the practice at home with great results. "I tried it at home, and it worked! I felt so much better afterwards," a student excitedly told her.



She also dialed into another unexpected challenge of distance learning. Students are accustomed to mastering a skill at school and then coming home to show their parents. With remote school, children were experiencing the initial failures that come with learning in front of their parents, stressing out parents and students alike. "Parents were coming to me in waves," she says, "seeing behavioral changes in their kids and unsure of what to do."

Everyone was going through the same trauma, and Kylie realized her job was to simply listen, validate, and offer suggestions and assistance. "Often, it's just listening, just being there, offering empathy and understanding. Sometimes, we need a place to just let it all out," she says.

Students and parents validate that it's working. One parent came to Kylie to report that their daughter came home and said simply, "Tell Ms. Kylie the bad things, so only the good things are left in your heart!"

Kylie introduced the Sonia Sotomayor book *Just Ask* to the students, addressing differences and diagnoses, and normalizing these differences in positive ways. A student perked up when Kylie read the story that resonated with him, smiling and raising his hand to say, "That's me!"

For Kylie, it's a calling, meeting students, parents, and staff where they are and making space for their struggles so they can find tools to manage them. "I approach relationships in the community with respect and authenticity, and that same energy comes back to me in return," she says. "With that trust, I collaborate with them, build with them, and heal with them."

Collaborating, building, and healing — exactly the elixir this pandemic demanded, and Ms. Kylie delivered.

MCS PINK TOWER SOCIETY

Throughout the pandemic, generous giving has prevailed and monthly giving programs have sustained organizations across our community with 45% of donors worldwide enrolled in a monthly giving program. In July 2021, MCS launched the Pink Tower Society, our monthly, recurring gifts program.

The Pink Tower Society is a special community of people committed to meeting the greatest needs of the school community every month and who make a long-term commitment to providing program support, financial aid scholarships, and campus enhancements that provide a safe and collaborative learning environment.

Pink Tower Society members receive quarterly progress updates containing stories of impact that your gifts are making for our students, exclusive invitations to "Tea with Marjie" and other special events throughout the year, and recognition in our publications (unless you choose to remain anonymous). ROBOTS, DRONES, AND SPAGHETTI BRIDGES MR. BOB BRINGS MAGIC TO IT ALL


"Mr. Bob" showed up at MCS some twenty years ago, enrolling his children at the school after becoming a dedicated Montessori parent on the mainland. While his children went on to Iolani School, and then out into the world, he stuck around at MCS, first as a volunteer Math Counts coach, then a couple of stints on the Board (including Board President), and eventually landing on the MCS payroll as the Computer and Coding instructor. Listen to his passion about Montessori, the MCS community, the kids, and the technology he shares with his students, and it's clear he'd do all of it, and more, with or without the paycheck. It's in his blood.


Bob Sisson is a man not fond of boredom. Even the mention of it seems vexing to him. Born and raised in Connecticut, Bob headed to college with medicine on the mind, his parents thrilled at the thought of their son, the doctor. When the MCATs dealt a sobering blow, he simply made other plans, joining the Air Force. "While my parents were initially disappointed, their son, the pilot seemed to work, too," Bob says, laughing.


"I never knew what work was for 16 years, every day flying planes and working with a team to complete our mission," he says. "And then I got a desk job and understood why people look forward to weekends." The Air Force brought Bob to Hawaii, and retirement kept him here. "I had to get the fun back, and working with kids brought that back."


While his work at MCS would keep most people busy, Bob is also the Postmaster at the Manoa Post Office, opening up every morning before heading to school and then swinging back through at the day's end. Nights and weekends are spent making films and other projects with his extensive Marvel collection and creating new projects, technology lessons, and creative curriculum to further challenge his students.

Bob knows the critical importance of collaboration and problem-solving, first from his Air Force days and now teaching his students. "That's what goes unnoticed about STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics)," he says. "Kids have to work together to accomplish their goal, whether it's robotics where you have to listen to each other and try different ideas to make it work or tackling projects like the spaghetti bridge challenge and taking each other's suggestions about how to build that bridge." (Yes, a spaghetti bridge. And that's just one of many crazy, fun challenges his students tackle.)










Bob brought his vision into reality when establishing MCS' technology education program, ensuring that students were versed on any platform, spending a year each working on PCs, then Apple laptops, and, finally, tablets. "We're so lucky to be alive in this period," he says. "Every student has all the world's available knowledge and information right there in his or her hands. It's amazing! They can research, consume, discover all parts of the world right there on their iPads."

It's easy to get swept away by Bob's passion and share his excitement and enthusiasm, whether it's how the solar system is much better understood through technology than on a piece of paper or how students light up when they realize all they can do with these tools that their parents could never have imagined. His enthusiasm is infectious, and it's clear the students tap straight into that excitement, making it their own and creating their own brilliance.

Bob's goal is to ensure his students know every device and tool inside and out, and he measures his success by what he calls the "Gimme moment." In the heat of creativity, when students are all huddled around the technology making a film or solving a problem, one student will spot a mistake that needs correcting and simply say "Gimme!," snatching the device, making the quick edit, and returning it to the huddled team in seconds so the collaboration can continue uninterrupted. "When they hit that moment, I know they've gotten it," Bob says.

As much as he loves the technology, it's MCS and the Montessori approach that truly inspire him. "I can spot an MCS student out in the community," he says. "I can tell by their confidence, how they handle themselves. MCS creates these special young people who then go out into the world with those skills." He pauses, seemingly overwhelmed by the awe of it all. "This school is creating foot soldiers of goodness who go out into the world for the betterment of society."

That's the magic. That's Mr. Bob. That's Montessori Community School.



PHILANTHROPY IS A FAMILY AFFAIR - THE DELSE FAMILY IS ALL IN

When Nikki and Fred Delse became parents – to their son Evan and then to their son Ian, a couple of years later – Nikki knew their boys would attend MCS. She'd spent her preschool through third grade years at MCS, herself, and after all these years, it still defines her. Luckily, Fred knew to listen to his wife and soon found himself as dedicated to MCS as she is. Their boys' joy, love of learning, and growing confidence and character sealed the deal.

Evan graduated from MCS in 2020, heading off to Punahou with several of his classmates, while Ian is an MCS 6th grader this year, and Nikki and Fred's generosity towards MCS is as deep and wide as ever. "I doubt we're anywhere close to the biggest monetary donors," Nikki says, "but we try to help whenever we can."

That's the thing about philanthropy. Of course financial support is essential, but so is showing up, doing what you can, and modeling for your own children what it means to do your part. Nikki reminisces about the MCS Scholastic Book Fairs, which, for several years, she volunteered to staff, transforming the Music Room into a literary oasis and spending days with her two boys, opening the fair, closing at the end of the day, and perusing countless books for themselves and for their classrooms.

She laughs that her parents and Fred's parents love showing up every year for Kupuna Day, excited to be part of the boys' lives and carefully selecting items from the teachers' wish lists, knowing that the boys will benefit from their generosity. Their children's education is a family affair, with parents, grandparents, and students alike participating and helping wherever they can.





When the pandemic changed the Fun Run, the annual school fundraiser which gets families and students outside and active to raise money for the Children's Education Fund, the children were given wrist-worn pedometers to count their steps and encourage parents, grandparents, neighbors and others to donate to the cause. "When Ian told us about it, we agreed to make a pledge based on steps," Nikki laughs, not realizing the depth of Ian's devotion to the task at hand. He racked up more than 20,000 steps a day, coming in at the top of the leaderboard and logging more than a half million steps. His parents proudly paid up.

When Nikki talks about Evan and Ian, she gets a bit emotional, tearing up as she describes what MCS has given her sons. "Knowing that whatever we do as a school community results in kids who love learning and are so well prepared for the rest of the world and the rest of their lives, there's nothing more valuable," she says.

As for Ian, he's all-in for the adventures still ahead of him. "I like MCS because of the independence we have and that we're not ordered around all the time," he says. When asked about leaving MCS in the not-too-distant future, he shrugs. "I'll be sad to leave, but I'll probably go to Punahou or Mid Pacific, and I know I'm ready to embrace a new school."

Building character. Creating life-long learners. Bringing families together for the good of the children. That's what Nikki knew and what Fred discovered about MCS' mission to deliver an education for life.

Education for Life

CHRIS MARVIN -CONTINUING TO SERVE

Husband. Father. Combat-wounded veteran. Community leader.

Heroes come in all types, and Chris Marvin is one of those heroes with lots of words describing him. Chris, one of MCS' unsung heroes, is a member of the MCS Board of Trustees and dedicated supporter of the school.

Parents, teachers, and friends have gone above and beyond the call of duty in service to our children during Covid, stepping up again and again every time we needed it. And people like Chris have been there, too, making powerful contributions and difficult decisions to keep our school thriving as we weathered this long pandemic storm.



Serving others comes naturally for Chris. A U.S. Army veteran and Black Hawk helicopter pilot, Chris was wounded in combat Afghanistan. You'd never know that though from his modest, humble demeanor and quiet but impactful contributions within our school community.

For over five years, Chris' expertise in strategy, communications, and collaborative leadership helped ground us as we created an inclusive environment that nurtures the spirit of the child and leads them to independence. 




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JERRY MUELLER A LIFELONG MONTESSORI TEACHER & MORE
